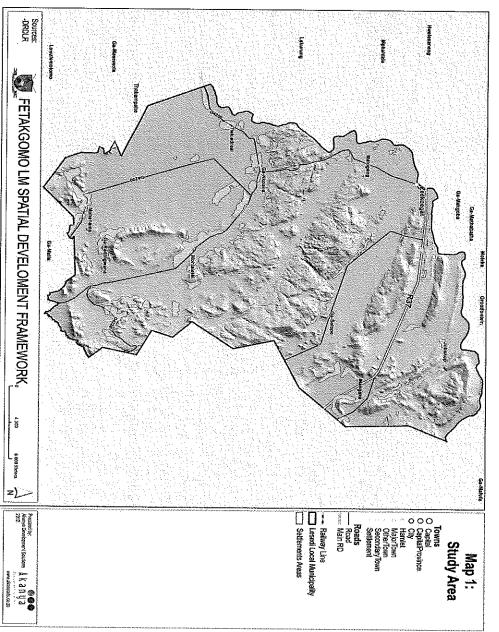


Figure 1: FTM Study Area

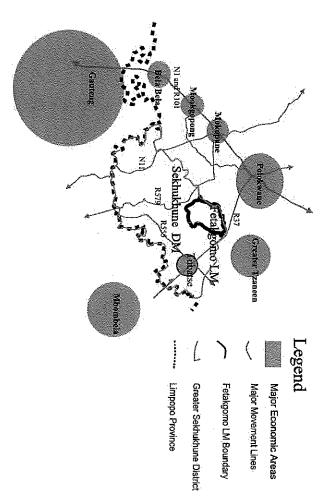


Figure 2: Provincial Economic Growth Zones

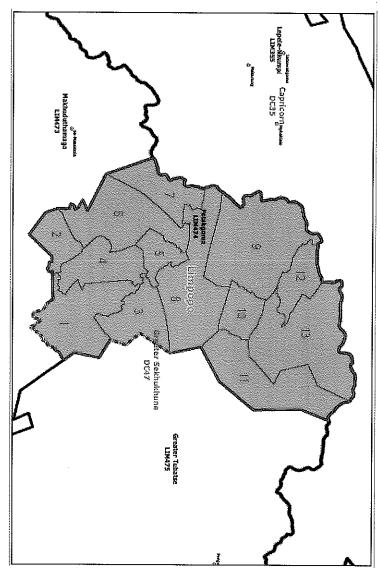

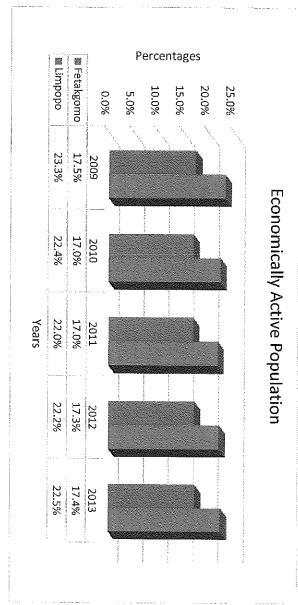

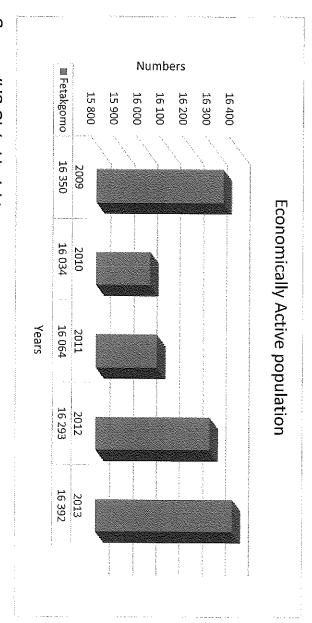

Figure 7: Economically Active population

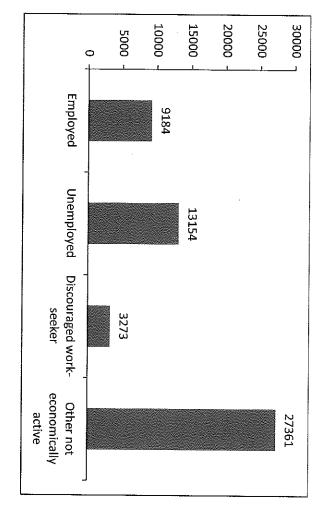

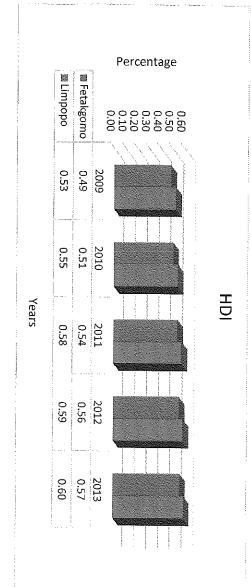

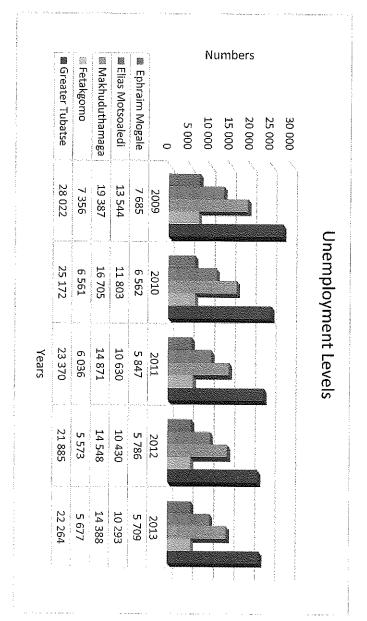
Figure 8: Human Development Index

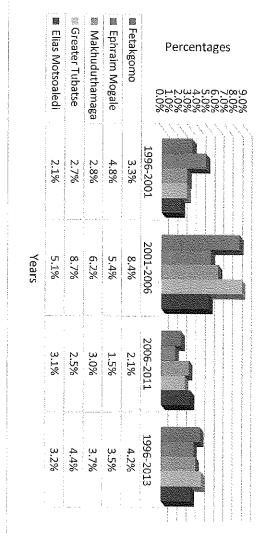

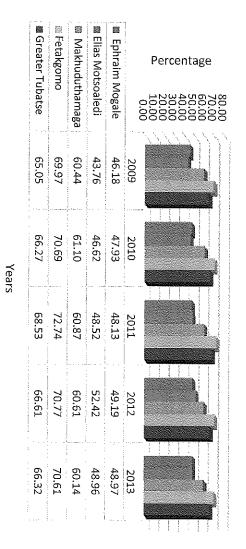

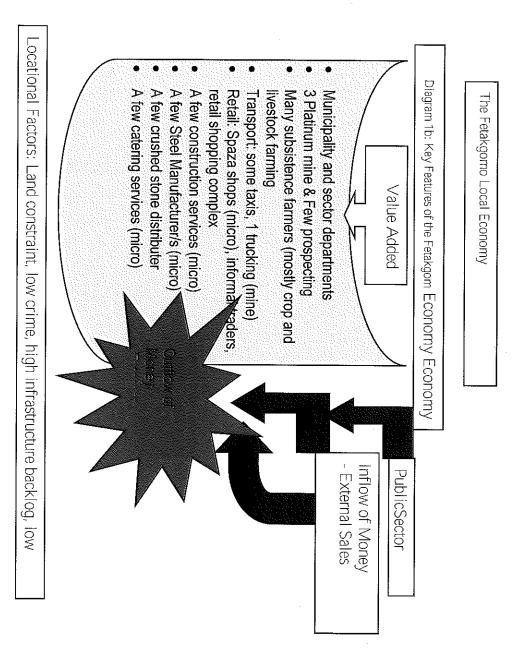


Diagram 1b: Key Features of the Fetakgomo's Economy
