We have reduced our heritage into a single day event and we shun practising our culture. We only wear our tradition attire of that particular day and throughout the year we do not. Let us go back to the old ways and start eating our traditional food and be proud of our music and other form of

cultural entertainment. As parents we must take the lead and transfer the traditional ways to our children. Our country is having a rich history that must be passed from one generation to the other and we must take this opportunity to make our children to start embracing our culture.

Let us make this to be a memorable day and let the festivities leave and imprint marks into the heads and mind our children.
